

Vale Bishop Patrick Power – a true shepherd and a voice for justice By Lou Mackay



Bishop Pat Power died last week at the age of 83.

Born in Cooma, we felt we could count him as 'one of us'. He was a deeply beloved man—humble to the end and inspirational in his unwavering advocacy for those on the margins of society.

Affectionately known as Father Pat, he often visited Cooma, where his sister Loretta and her husband Mick lived. His nieces attended our school, and his presence in the community was always warm and familiar.

Throughout his ministry, Bishop Pat lived the Christian values of empathy, justice, and service. He officiated weddings, confirmations, and funerals with sincerity and care, always making people feel seen and valued. Even in retirement, he continued to serve—filling in for Masses, visiting the sick, and regularly celebrating Christmas Mass at the Cooma gaol.

I remember one Christmas, he told me a story about leaving the gaol in plain clothes, carrying his battered Mass bag. A visitor mistook him for a released inmate and said, "What a lovely day to be getting out of gaol." He simply smiled and agreed.

Father Pat was the first to help, the first to notice the unnoticed, and the first to speak out for justice. His legacy is one of love, courage, and deep humanity.

We are blessed to have had him share a part of our lives here in Cooma.

A message from the AP's Desk....

I wrote this article in mid-2024. Unfortunately, I feel the need for it to be communicated once again.

Who taught you to tell the time, to tie your shoelaces or how to write a complex sentence? I have memories of my parents and teachers taking a shared hand in helping me to learn these skills as a child. But what about more challenging tasks? Who taught you to be resilient, analyse a poem or to solve complex algorithms? The answer is probably both a parent and a teacher.

Mr Hamilton (my favourite teacher of all time), continually displayed his love for reading and writing (particularly for science fiction and fantasy genres). By the end of that year, I also shared this passion and became an avid reader of similar books. Mr H is also the reason why I wanted to become a teacher!

I remember my parents encouraging me to practise what I was learning in class and to do what the teacher asked (even if they sometimes disagreed with what they were doing). Why? My Dad told me that he would not question them in their profession, just the same as they would not walk onto a building site and tell him what to do.

In my first 15 years of teaching, I saw how both parents and teachers respected and supported each other.

Unfortunately, over the last 4-5 years I have seen a decline in respect that some parents have for teachers.

Recently, I have been informed by teachers, relief teachers and support staff that some parents are becoming more aggressive towards them. There are some parents who believe that they have the right to storm into a classroom to berate or make demands while the teacher is teaching their class. **This is not acceptable.**

I am also aware of several Facebook groups that are set up for different year levels. It has also come to my attention that there has been conversations where the teacher has been spoken about between parents who are part of these groups.

Talking about a teacher on any social media site <u>is not acceptable</u>. It could also potentially become a legal situation, if a teacher has been defamed (whether oral or in written form). There have been times when I have been sent a screenshot of messages talking poorly about our teachers.

What is the learning taking place here?

What some children may be learning and witnessing at home (if they hear parent conversations speaking negatively about their teacher) is that it is okay to speak rudely and argue back to a teacher. It is well-documented that the children of these parents are regularly the ones who argue and refuse to do what the teachers quite reasonably ask them to do. A few weeks ago a student of one of these parents told the teacher that they could do what they-wanted because their mum told them that they could refuse the teacher's directions.

I would like to pose these questions; would it be acceptable to walk into the doctor's surgery and demand an appointment? Would you walk into your solicitor's office and berate them in front of their peers because you disagreed with their policies?


While both parents and teachers are influential, albeit in different ways, as far as children's learning is concerned, <u>education is a shared responsibility</u>. If there is an issue that needs to be raised, parents need to organise a meeting with their child's teacher instead of talking about them on a social media platform.

Schools, friends, families and communities all play unique but complementary roles. We are all here for one thing - the children!

If you are not sure about something that is happening at school, please talk to your child's teacher instead of with other parents or on social platforms.

Tournament of Minds Success!

Tournament of Minds is a problem-solving program for teams of students, designed to challenge their creativity, collaboration, and critical thinking across a range of disciplines. This year, we proudly had three teams participate in the competition, representing The Arts, STEM, and Social Science.

Over six weeks, students worked together to solve a long-term challenge, which they presented to a panel of judges. On competition day, they also tackled a spontaneous problem-solving task as a team, in front of judges who assessed their teamwork and solution. Both scores were combined, and all three of our teams placed either first or second in their disciplines.

All three teams were then invited to the ACT State Final, held on Sunday 14th September, where they faced an unknown three-hour challenge. They were required to deliver their solution through a dramatic performance in front of judges and an audience. They also completed another spontaneous challenge, with both scores combined to determine the winning team for each discipline.

We are thrilled to announce that our Arts and STEM teams were declared winners in their respective disciplines, while our Social Science team were Runners Up and awarded Honours. The winning teams will now travel to Sydney at the end of October to represent the ACT at the Tournament of Minds International Final, competing against teams from across Australia, New Zealand, and other international regions.

We are incredibly proud of the success of all three teams, especially given the strong competition from much larger schools. We wish our Arts and STEM teams the very best of luck in the International Final!
